Thank you very much for your further letter of the 23rd May which I have just received. I shall be very glad indeed to have details of the yardage and prices which Rice & Company have made for United Africa during the last few years, together with the approximate yardage and prices bought by United Africa from other sources.

I notice in your letter the suggestion that the policy of Unilevers is monopoly in Africa in buying African produce and monopoly in Africa in selling to the African. Similar suggestions were made in the issue of the "Chorley Guardian" for May 19th and as soon as I saw them I went to the trouble of making the fullest enquiries into these points.

As a matter of fact these suggestions are unfounded and the facts are not as stated in the "Chorley Guardian" leader. I shall be writing a letter to the Editor for publication in next week's issue.

Can you tell me the date of the visit you paid to John Birch & Company, of Ratcliffe, and let me have a

definite statement that they were selling at $2\frac{3}{4}$ weavings
to United Africa Company Limited cloth similar to that
which you were producing at two weavings at the same time?
